School History and the Lasallian Tradition

La Salle High School was founded in 1956 at the request of His Eminence James Francis Cardinal McIntyre to the San Francisco District of the Brothers of the Christian Schools for construction and operation of a Catholic boys high school to serve the northern and eastern sections of the San Gabriel Valley. Today, La Salle High School continues to function as a private Catholic, co-educational, college preparatory high school. It is a Lasallian School - an educational institution that draws its philosophy and inspiration from the Christian Brothers whose reputation for excellence in education extends back to 1680. The De La Salle Christian Brothers are part of a worldwide educational movement with over 1,000 schools within which 3,835 Brothers and 92,000 Lasallian Partners teach over 1,000,000 students in 77 countries. It is an education without borders. These schools serve nearly every ethnic group and religion around the world. In addition to providing strong academics, each Lasallian school creates a community of persons deeply conscious of their responsibilities to each other, which is central to their success.

La Salle High School is dedicated to excellent student performance in academics, arts and athletics. Of particular importance is La Salle High School's call to carry out the Mission established by its founder, Saint John Baptist De La Salle, "to give a human and Christian education to the young, especially the poor." Lancer athletics, Student Life, visual and performing arts, honors and service societies, student clubs and organizations, and student television broadcasts and publication provide a healthy and warm community atmosphere for all La Salle students.

Student Enrollment and Demographics

At La Salle High School, there are 665 students from the ninth through twelfth grades. To maintain our Catholic identity, approximately two-thirds of our entering freshmen acceptances are of the Catholic faith. In addition, 27% of our students are from low income families and receive full or partial tuition assistance through the San Miguel and Brother Celestine Scholarship Funds. Average student/teacher ratio is 11:1 and the average class size is 24.

Curriculum

La Salle's curriculum pursues a rigorous balance between college preparatory courses, religious education and enrichment opportunities. It is also committed to a values-based preparation for college that flows from a commitment to religious principles. Service-learning is built into the curriculum during each of the four years. By the end of the senior year, students will have completed in excess of 75 hours of Christian service as part of their coursework. Graduation requirements meet or exceed the University of California minimum subject requirements for freshmen admission, with more than 79 courses currently UC certified or approved.

Graduation Requirements

275 units are required for graduation. Among those, 245 units are of required courses. Students are required to take 7 courses per year in 9^{th} , 10^{th} , and 11^{th} grades, and 6 classes in 12^{th} grade.



Grading

The traditional A-F grading system, with plus and minus, is used. There is no A+. Honors and AP courses are weighted with one extra point when calculating GPA.

Grade Point Average and Ranking Policy

The GPAs for the Class of 2018 are cumulative from grades 9 through 11 on a weighted 4.0 scale, and include all academic courses and advanced courses. La Salle <u>does not rank</u> its students.

Advanced Placement and Honors Courses

The La Salle curriculum includes 17 Advanced Placement courses, in addition to honors courses in English, math, science, social studies and Spanish. Enrollment in AP and honors courses is restricted to those who qualify through placement tests and teacher recommendations. Enrollment in AP science courses and AP Studio Art is restricted to those students who have already taken a one-year prerequisite course. In 2016-2017, 204 students took 410 AP exams, with 78% of students obtaining a score of 3 or better on at least one of their exams.

Co-Curricular Accomplishments

La Salle's Academic Decathlon teams won 48 medals in the 2017 competition and qualified for the Scholar's Cup in Cape Town, South Africa, where they finished 10th and 11th overall out of teams from 32 countries and qualified for the Tournament of Champions at Yale University. Lancer Athletics qualified 16 out of 21 varsity teams for CIF playoffs. Girls basketball advanced to the CIF semifinals. All 21 varsity teams achieved a GPA of 3.0 or higher. In the 2016-2017 postseason, La Salle's Speech & Debate team qualified for the Tournament of Champions at University of Kentucky and then qualified for the National Speech & Debate Competition in Birmingham, Alabama. La Salle finished as one of the top 30 teams in the nation.
